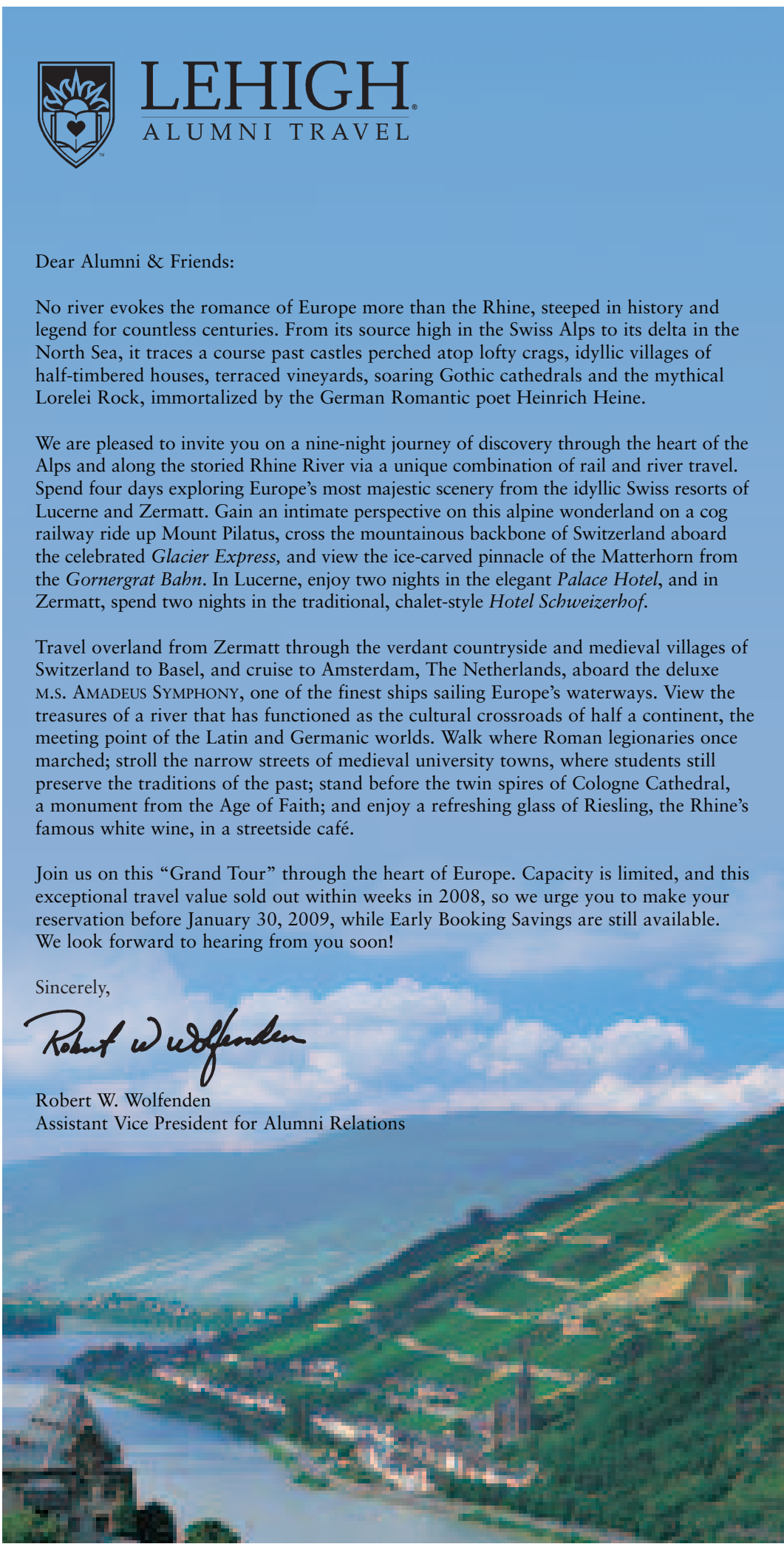

Spend four days exploring Europe's most majestic scenery from the idyllic Swiss resorts of Lucerne and Zermatt. Gain an intimate perspective on this alpine wonderland on a cog railway ride up Mount Pilatus, cross the mountainous backbone of Switzerland aboard the celebrated *Glacier Express*, and view the ice-carved pinnacle of the Matterhorn from the *Gornergrat Bahn*. In Lucerne, enjoy two nights in the elegant *Palace Hotel*, and in Zermatt, spend two nights in the traditional, chalet-style *Hotel Schweizerhof*.

Travel overland from Zermatt through the verdant countryside and medieval villages of Switzerland to Basel, and cruise to Amsterdam, The Netherlands, aboard the deluxe M.S. AMADEUS SYMPHONY, one of the finest ships sailing Europe's waterways. View the treasures of a river that has functioned as the cultural crossroads of half a continent, the meeting point of the Latin and Germanic worlds. Walk where Roman legionaries once marched; stroll the narrow streets of medieval university towns, where students still preserve the traditions of the past; stand before the twin spires of Cologne Cathedral, a monument from the Age of Faith; and enjoy a refreshing glass of Riesling, the Rhine's famous white wine, in a streetside café.

Join us on this "Grand Tour" through the heart of Europe. U.S./ZURICH, SWITZERLAND/ LUCERNE

Monday, June 15 and Tuesday, June 16
Depart for Zurich. Following your arrival, transfer by motorcoach to Lucerne, where deluxe accommodations await you in the *Palace Hotel*, picturesquely located on the shore of Lake Lucerne.

A long-favored destination, Lucerne is set against the backdrop of its deep blue lake and the rugged grandeur of Mounts Rigi and Pilatus. It also offers a unique ambiance of cosmopolitan sophistication combined with old-world charm. Begin your afternoon walking tour in the *Weinmarkt* (Wine Market), surrounded by historic burghers' houses. See the *Hofkirche* (Court Church), one of the finest examples of Swiss Renaissance architecture, and the Lion Monument, dedicated to the Swiss Guards who gave their lives defending Louis XVI during the French Revolution. Walk across the Chapel Bridge, a quaint, 14th-century wooden structure spanning the Reuss River and adorned with medieval paintings. Attend the welcome cocktail reception this evening.

LUCERNE

Wednesday, June 17
After breakfast, drive to the foot of Mount Pilatus and ride by cable car to its 7,000-foot summit for a 360-degree view of the peaks, forests and lakes of central Switzerland. Following lunch in the historic *Kulm Hotel Restaurant*, enjoy free time before riding down to Lake Lucerne aboard the *Pilatus Bahn*, the world's steepest cog railway descending more than 5,300 feet in under three miles. In Alpnachstadt, embark a ship for a relaxing cruise back to Lucerne. The evening is on your own.

LUCERNE/ANDERMATT/ZERMATT Thursday, June 18

Set out on the scenic transfer from Lucerne to Andermatt. After lunch, board the fabled *Glacier Express*, "the fastest slow train in the world," and set out through the heart of the Alps. Pass by everchanging vistas of lofty, snow-crowned peaks, ribbon-like waterfalls, rushing streams, glacier-carved valleys, lush upland meadows and storybook mountain villages. The journey showcases both natural and man-made wonders, for the beauty of the Alps is rivaled by the skill and ingenuity of the engineers who laid out this route across Europe's most challenging terrain—a task requiring the construction of 291 bridges and 91 tunnels. Arrive late this afternoon in the alpine resort of Zermatt, dramatically set beneath the craggy pinnacle of the Matterhorn. Check into the chalet-style *Hotel Schweizerhof* for dinner and an evening at leisure.

ZERMATT

Friday, June 19
This morning, walk to the Gornergrat train station for a scenic ride aboard the open-carriage *Gornergrat Bahn*, one of Switzerland's famous cog railways. Ascend through forests of pine and larch and cross meadows ablaze with wildflowers to the 10,000-foot-high Gornergrat, stopping en route at Riffelberg for the panoramic view of Monte Rosa and the Matterhorn. From the observatory atop the Gornergrat, gaze upon sweeping vistas of Europe's most majestic alpine scenery—the serrated profiles of the Matterhorn, Liskamm and Dufourspitze and the trackless Gorner Glacier. Following lunch, enjoy additional time in the observatory and return to Zermatt at your leisure.

ZERMATT/MONTREUX/ GRUYÈRES/BASEL

Saturday, June 20

Transfer by shuttle train to the nearby village of Täsch. Board a motorcoach and head west, following the course of the Rhône River in its descent from the snow-crowned heights of the Alps down to the subtropical lowlands of Lake Geneva. Just as the scenery changes abruptly, so too does the language, as *Schwyzerdütsch* (Swiss German) gives way to French. Stop in the fashionable spa city of Montreux on the “Swiss Riviera,” the northern shore of Lake Geneva. In the 19th century, such leading European literary figures as Lord Byron, Mary Shelley, Leo Tolstoy and Hans Christian Andersen flocked here to appreciate its mild climate and Mediterranean flora. Continue through the heart of *la Suisse romande*—French-speaking Switzerland—to the untouched medieval village of Gruyères, dominated by its namesake 1,000-year-old castle. The residents of Gruyères still live close to the land and take justifiable pride in their farm-made cheeses. After lunch, drive to Basel. Embark the deluxe M.S. AMADEUS SYMPHONY and begin your Rhine River cruise early this evening.

STRASBOURG, FRANCE

Sunday, June 21

A lively French city with a distinct German flavor, cosmopolitan Strasbourg fuses the Old and the New Europe. Medieval houses still stand beside its placid waterways and *Ponts-Couverts*—covered bridges with watchtowers at each end—stand guard over its canals, while representatives of 25 nations engage in spirited debates in the futuristic European Parliament building. Dominating the Old City is the graceful, sandstone Cathedral of Notre Dame, a Romanesque-Gothic masterpiece rising, in the words of

the German poet Goethe, “like a most sublime, wide-arching tree of God.” The Church of St-Pierre-le-Vieux testifies to Strasbourg’s history of religious tolerance, for it contains two houses of worship, one Catholic and one Protestant. In the *Petite-France* district, the historic millers’, tanners’ and fishermen’s quarter along the Ill River, the leisurely pace of a past era lives on.

Following lunch aboard ship, the afternoon is free for independent pursuits. Depart Strasbourg this evening.

MANNHEIM, GERMANY (HEIDELBERG)

Monday, June 22

In Mannheim, board a motorcoach and set out for the university town of Heidelberg. Nestled in the wooded valley of the Neckar River, Heidelberg emerged largely unscathed from World War II and has preserved its Renaissance-Baroque character. The nine arches of the *Alte Brücke* (Old Bridge) span

the Neckar. Walk through the heart of the Old Town and view the Late Gothic Church of the Holy Spirit, built from locally quarried red sandstone; the Knight's House, an elegant 16th-century mansion representative of the German Mannerist style; and the austere façade of the 18th-century Jesuit Church, which belies a lavishly adorned interior. Visit imposing Heidelberg Castle, once the residence of the Counts Palatine of the Holy Roman Empire. Damaged during the Thirty Years' War (1618-48) and a subsequent French invasion, the stately ruins preserve Heidelberg's links with its medieval past.

Reboard the ship in Mannheim and cruise downstream to Rudesheim.

RÜDESHEIM/KOBLENZ

Tuesday, June 23

Step ashore in the medieval town of Rudesheim, the heart of Germany's wine country. Stroll along the Drosselgasse past picturesque half-timbered houses, see the

12th-century Brömserburg castle, or savor local vintages in a traditional wine bar. Continue downstream through the Lorelei Passage, designated a UNESCO World Heritage site for its scenic and architectural treasures. Pass by medieval castles, tranquil villages and terraced vineyards to see the famous Lorelei Rock—ancient legends hold that a beautiful maiden once sat atop it and lured sailors to their doom with her enchanting voice.

Dock this afternoon in Koblenz, a link to Germany's Roman past. Established in nine B.C. during the reign of Augustus Caesar, it occupies a strategic location at the confluence of the Rhine and Moselle rivers. From the *Deutsches Eck* (German Corner), where the two rivers meet, enjoy a view of the impressive 17th-century fortress of Ehrenbreitstein on the opposite bank of the Rhine, once the residence of the powerful Archbishop-Electors of Trier. The twin-towered Basilica of St. Castor, built between the 11th and 13th centuries,

Alpine flowers adorn the railing of Lucerne's 14th-century Kapellbrücke, Europe's oldest covered wooden bridge, which features a famous painting on its roof's interior of William Tell shooting the apple from his son's head.

AMADEUS SYMPHONY, a member of the prestigious Amadeus Premium river fleet and one of the finest vessels to ply the waterways of Europe. Its comfortable accommodations and personalized service blend perfectly with the ship's sleek lines, impeccable construction and state-of-the-art technology to provide an ideal venue for exploring the natural and historical treasures of the Rhine River.

All 69 tastefully appointed staterooms are outside and, at a standard 160 square feet, more spacious than those typically found on river ships. Staterooms feature two twin beds (convertible to one double bed), private bathroom facilities with shower, air conditioning, telephone, television and writing desk; staterooms on the Mozart and Strauss Decks feature a panoramic window. Additionally, the four 220-square-foot Junior suites include a stylish lounge area, sofa bed and minibar.

Meals are served in a single open seating in the panoramic restaurant, where guests savor gourmet Continental cuisine while enjoying views of the passing landscape. The ship has two bars, one featuring nightly musical entertainment; sun deck with lounge chairs and walking track; hair salon; boutique; and fitness center.

COLOGNE

Wednesday, June 24

One of Germany's most ancient cities, Cologne was founded as the Roman military outpost of *Colonia Agrippina* in 38 B.C. and was named for the wife of Emperor Claudius. From Charlemagne's time to the present, it has flourished as the Rhineland's foremost religious and mercantile center. Begin your exploration in the historic *Altstadt* (Old Town), where tall, narrow houses painted in pastel shades line the streets, lanes and inviting squares. The city's ecclesiastical heritage is reflected in 12 beautifully-restored Romanesque churches, including St. Andreas, Great St. Martin and St. Gereon. Walk through the soaring nave of Cologne Cathedral, a medieval fantasy in stone and the finest example of High Gothic architecture in Germany. Begun in 1248,

construction lasted for six centuries; its artistic treasures include the *Altar of the Magi*, the *Milan Madonna and Child* and the *Shrine of the Three Kings*.

Cruise the historic Rhine this afternoon.

Thursday, June 25

Following breakfast, transfer to the airport for your return flight to the U.S.

SWISS ALPINE RAILWAYS— MARVELS OF ENGINEERING

Switzerland possesses not only the most majestic but also the most challenging terrain in Europe, with its 14,000-foot peaks, racing torrents, deep gorges and huge glaciers. In the 19th century, Swiss political leaders, in an effort to promote national unity, initiated an unprecedented program of railroad building. Overcoming formidable obstacles, visionary engineers succeeded in their task and created a network of steel linking every corner of this diverse land.

Three distinctive rail journeys will enable you to appreciate the vast scope of their achievement as you experience the sublime majesty of the Alps at close range. The *Gornergrat Bahn*, which began service in 1898, is Switzerland's oldest electrified cog railway. In the brief span of seven miles, this open-carriage train climbs 4,800 feet from Zermatt to the Gornergrat. No less remarkable is Lucerne's *Pilatus Bahn*, designed by the engineer and inventor Eduard Locher and completed in 1889. In its three-mile run, it makes a vertical ascent of 5,344 feet from the shores of Lake Lucerne to the summit of Mount Pilatus over a grade as steep as 48%.

No feat, however, required greater skill and determination than the laying of the track for the *Glacier Express*. On June 20, 1930, the Swiss Federal Railways inaugurated service across Europe's rugged mountain spine—the towering Alps. Over the ensuing three quarters of a century, travelers have enjoyed this scenic, leisurely journey. Sleek, modern carriages glide along the track linking Zermatt, dramatically located against the distinctive pyramidal backdrop of the Matterhorn, to the forested heart of Switzerland and the world-famous destination of St. Moritz. The rail route represents a triumph of engineering ingenuity—the nine-and-one-half-mile-long Furka Tunnel penetrates the mountainous barrier separating the cantons of Valais and Uri, and arched stone bridges span the tumbling headwaters of two of the continent's greatest rivers, the Rhône and the Rhine.

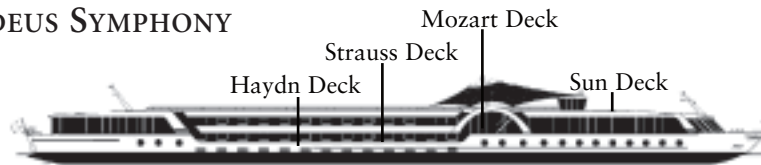
